What is English Haiku?

Haiku is considered to be the shortest poem in the world. Japanese Haiku generally contains Kigo, a seasonal word/reference, to describe the season and consists of three phrases. But, there are no strict rules on English Haiku composition, and Kigo is not essential. Three-line haiku is desirable.
